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1. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

1.1 INTRODUCTION

It is said that Goutama Rishi performed penance to Surya (son God), and installed the idol of Arkeshwara, the presiding deity of the local Arkeshwara temple and town was originally called ARKAPURI. Hence the name Arkalgud came into existence. It was founded by Krishnappa Nayaka, one of the Aigur (Balam) chiefs in 1568 A.D. it was then captured by Kantirava Narasaraja I of Mysore in 1647 A.D. It was retaken subsequently by Keladi Shivappa Nayaka of Ikkeri and finally in 1694 by Chikkadevaraja Wodeyar of Mysore

Arkalgud is a panchayat town and is one among the eight taluks of Hassan District in the state of Karnataka, India. It is situated 33 km from Hassan and 210 km from Bangalore. The River Hemavati forms the entire northern boundary of the taluk. River Kaveri runs through a portion of the south. It is well connected by road to many towns and the cities of Karnataka. Sri A.N.Krishnarao popularly known as AA.NA.Kru famous for his literature work belongs to Arkalgud

The Government first grade college, Arkalgud came into existence in the year 1984 with 17 students. The classes were started in the building of the Government Junior college Arakalgud. The need for own building was fulfilled in 1993 with the construction of a separate building on a campus of 9 acres. Since then it continues to be an important center of higher education. The college is a real blessing to the students of rural agricultural families of Arakalgud and its neighbouring villages. During the past thirty five years the institution has developed in different aspects and has become a boon to the students of the surrounding villages.

It is a matter of pride to mention here that this collage is permanently affiliated to the University of Mysore and college is working under the Department of Collegiate Education, Karnataka. The College offers three years degree programmes like B.A., B.Com., B.B.A.

The College is recognised by UGC under section 2(f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act 1956. The college has undergone assessment & accreditation by NAAC C+ grade in 2004, C grade in 2016 (cycle 2).

Tuning with the modern trends and needs, the college has set its unique vision and mission with a list of meaningful objectives. 1.3 CRITERIA WISE SUMMARY

Curricular Aspects

The institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process. The institute follows the curriculum of Mysore University, develops a structured and effective implementation of the curriculum and executes the curriculum through various methods. Institutional head conducts meetings with all the faculties where timetable and calendar of events of the college are circulated. Heads of all the departments discuss their action plans to be implemented in that semester.

An academic calendar is prepared as per the Mysore University's academic schedule and the requirements at the department level as per the action plan. At the beginning of each semester, a course plan is prepared which includes course outcomes, course objectives, and topics to be covered, teaching methods like lecture method, chalk and talk, problem solving, etc, It also includes the assignment topics for their continuous internal assessment. The institution takes several measures like the preparation of lesson plans, timetable, Internal tests to ensure effective delivery of curriculum. At the time of preparing lesson plan, care is taken to ensure that apart from covering syllabus, there is sufficient room for revision, class test, refresher and remedial sessions too. Innovative methods of learning like Seminars (class level as well as college level), Group Discussions, Industrial Visit, Power point presentation, e-learning, are encouraged and practiced as innovative methods of teaching.

Field visits are conducted periodically to help the students to get first-hand information on what is taught in class.

The faculty members have enhanced their pedagogical skills through participation in national and international seminars, workshops, Refresher/orientation courses. The faculties under take the responsibility delegated to them by university and participated as evaluators during university evaluation process.

During covid-19 pandemic our faculties have actively involved in providing online education ,and have actively participated in LMS implementation at our college.

The internal evaluation process is carried out as per the guidelines issued by the university, Internal marks are recorded and uploaded to the university portal.

Serious efforts are taken by IQAC to ensure feedback from students, teachers and alumini.

Teaching-learning and Evaluation

The College is a Government Institution and it adopts a transparent admission process based on the government's reservation policy. Students from general merit, schedule caste, tribe, backward communities, minorities, students with excellent academic credentials and first-generation learners from economically disadvantaged sections of the society seek admissions to the College. Thus, diversity is visible in the admission process. The College is a preferred academic destination for the students due to the disciplined atmosphere, good academic output, conducive learning ambience and the facilities available in the campus.

There has been a steady increase in the number of girl students getting admission to this college over the years which indicates that the institution is catering to educational need of rural girls who do not have access to higher education. The Divyangjan in particular are encouraged to participate in all activities of the college.

At the beginning of every academic year the IQAC plans an orientation programme to create awareness about the college and its website, courses, activities, facilities available in the various committees and cells. In this programme students are made aware of the vision, mission statements and the code of conduct of the college. Mentoring system establishes rapport between the teacher and students who keep track of students' academic and non-academic pursuits.

Student centric methods

The College ensures student-centric learning making the process an experiential, interactive and participatory through group discussions, role plays, peer teaching, field surveys, industrial visits, debates, quiz and the like. The teachers are friendly with the students and are easily accessible to students. Slow and Advanced Learners are identified by the teachers and appropriate measures are devised for the betterment of the slow and advanced learners. Among them Remedial classes and ICT based teaching learning facility, film and documentary shows, industrial visits, surveys, debates, seminars, further enrich teaching and learning. Students are encouraged to view the journals and the faculty provides study material either by lending their own prepared material or through book bank.

Evaluation of students performance

- It is based on the attainment of POs, PSOs and COs. These are communicated to all the students by teachers and also displayed on the College Website.
- Evaluation of internal examination is done in a transparent, fair and just manner on a time bound basis and the result is displayed on the student notice board.
- In case of any grievances, the students may approach the concerned teachers and also examination committee.
- The internal assessment marks are uploaded on the affiliating university portal after resolving all student related grievances.
- External Examination related grievances are also attended by the College promptly.

College encourages its faculty members to use ICT enabled tools for the best outcome of the Teaching-Learning process including online resources for effective teaching and learning process.

The College has highly competent and experienced teachers and adopts creative and innovative measures for effective curriculum delivery. Some Faculty are actively engaged in research and publication of articles and papers. To update with changing trends in the academics, teachers are attending workshops, seminars,

conferences, faculty development programmes, and short-term courses in online and regular modes.

Research, Innovations and Extension

The college encourages its staff to take initiatives in research activities. Most of our teachers have published and are publishing their research works in journals. Many of our teachers are pursuing their Doctoral degrees and have published a good number of papers in UGC listed journals. Teachers have also presented papers in national / international conferences which are published in the conference proceedings with ISBN/ISSN numbers. Extension activities are conducted to sensitize students and the community about various social and environmental issues through Swacch Bhartah Abhiyan, NSS, Scouts and Guides. We are conducting blood donation camps regularly by Youth Red Cross unit of the college. Outreach programs like creating awareness about voting, wearing helmet, drug addiction, health and sanitation issues etc. are conducted in collaboration with industries, police department, lawyers' association, etc.; The students actively take part in jathas, surveys and awareness programs. Infrastructure and Learning Resources

The institution is well equipped with the necessary infrastructure with 9 acre and 1 acre built up area. The Institution provides for the entire academic, cultural and sports requirements of the students. There are total of 13 classrooms of which 4 are ICT enabled and one ICT enabled seminar hall. Each room is furnished with sufficient desks, a podium, green & white boards, tables and are well ventilated. Computer laboratory is well-equipped with UPS facilities. There are 58 computers in the college. Out of these 6 computers are used for office and administrative purpose and remaining are accommodated in the computer lab. The computer lab is facilitated with LAN, Wi-Fi, UPS and computers are protected by antivirus. The library with reference and reading room facilities are provided. There are 26490 books are available in the library. The college has a playground, hygienic toilets, RO drinking water facility, water dispenser with hot and cold water, parking place for staff and students, ramp for specially abled people. The campus is under CCTV surveillance. There are 08 cameras installed in the important areas of the campus.

Student Support and Progression

The College supports its students in academics, extracurricular activities and exploring career opportunities. The students are encouraged to apply for government scholarships. Freeships are provided to students requiring financial assistance. Meritorious students are felicitated through scholarships and awards.

The College facilitates awareness about available career options and organizes career-counselling activities and interactive experience-sharing sessions through Placement cell. Students are also encouraged to enrol in soft skill training programs which polish their personalities and qualities of head and heart so that they can confidently face the world independently. Besides, a large number of our students have joined Universities/Colleges for higher education and many have succeeded in competitive exams.

The College believes in holistic development of students and offers variety of platforms through which they can enhance their skills and contribute to the society. They are encouraged to participate in the cultural, cocurricular and sports events and join societies such as Eco Club, Women Development Cell, Equal Opportunity Cell and NSS, which sensitise them to social issues and encourage inclusivity. The college also publishes its annual magazine “Arunodaya” which provides a platform for students creative writing.

The College values its students and considers them as important stakeholders. the college has granted membership of students in various administrative bodies of the college such as Cultural committee, Eco club, Grievance and Redressal Committee, Magazine Committee, Heritage club, Redcross, Bharath Scouts and Guides, NSS and IQAC of the College. Further, if the students have any grievances, the College has established mechanisms for speedy redressal of the same. The College maintains a strong connect with its alumni.

1. Multidisciplinary/interdisciplinary:	<p>Multidisciplinary /interdisciplinary approach is the essence of NEP. 2. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	<p>The Government has taken a good initiative in coming up with Academic Bank of Credits under the Digital India initiative where students can access all their Academic Records in Digital Form where ever they can access. It is necessary to create awareness about the Academic bank credit facility both among teachers and students, as it enhances the flexibility in higher education in terms of mobility across time and universities. Because of cultural disconnect, the borrowed knowledge cannot provide perfect solutions in Indian socio economic framework. To the contrary, it may add many unforeseen problems, complicating the whole system. Integrating Indian Knowledge System into the curriculum is need of the hour. Channelizing the academic efforts in that direction will definitely help us to connect our generations of students to the</p>

	<p>Indian wisdom. This may include teaching Indian languages, music, philosophy etc. Online education is a strongest delivery channel to reach the target audience effectively and economically. Online delivery ensures automatic documentation, inclusiveness, flexibility, dynamism and optimization. Sanskrut, mother of all Indian languages, along with any of the native languages can be taught to the younger generations. Indian languages are most scientifically developed with perfect phonetics, script and logical grammar. The great epics, poetry, theatrical texts, Vedas, Upanishads, Bhagavad-Gita can provide rich source of knowledge, imagination, creativity for the students. Indian folklore is a rich treasure of our ancient wisdom, hidden in songs, dances, celebrations, costumes, practices. The students will be gaining from these sources.</p>

Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):</p>	<p>The programme objective, programme outcome and programme specific outcome are very clearly defined for all the courses offered in the college thus ensuring that the students know what to expect at the end of the course. The various job opportunities as well as the higher education options are made known to the students thus resulting in clear planning by a student to choose the path on completion of the course. The institution is a college affiliated to the Mysore University; thus the syllabus framed and approved by the University is adopted in total by the institution. Many physical, social and academic activities are pursued in the institution regularly. An inter disciplinary approach in curriculum is introduced as a part of National Education Policy. The course contents are effectively communicated to the students. Students are well informed about the assessment methodology of their course. The student is given information about the criteria of assessment, the scores required for passing as well as for getting good grades; the assessment is done through conducting internal tests, seminars in class, and University examinations. Distance education/online education:</p>	<p>Online Education gives students the flexibility of learning from their homes as well as pursuing courses of their choice which otherwise may not have been possible owing to distance, paucity of time, etc. Through online mode, students can pursue courses offered by SWAYAM, MOOCs, etc which will give them an edge in the job market. These online courses also bridge the gap between theoretical knowledge and its practical application. COVID-19 pandemic has introduced the masses to online education and various online learning tools which otherwise would have been limited to an interested few. The students have accepted the shift from the concept of traditional classroom to virtual classroom. The teachers have learnt how to conduct classes efficiently through online mode thus giving scope for hybrid classes which ensures maximum attendance. The popularity and acceptance of online courses has increased. The curriculum of NEP introduces the students to digital fluency. The State Government has a tie-up with NASSCOM for the content delivery of digital fluency course which equips the students with use of computer for various basic operations through laboratory activities so that they can practice the theoretical knowledge and they also get to learn about operating systems, computer networks, database management systems, etc. Online education is beneficial to the teachers as well because they can make use of various online resources to teach which makes teaching as well as learning very interesting and they can meet the learning requirements of different types of students. Online assignments are also another way of educating the students about the online library resources. Online teaching exposes teachers to a variety of online teaching resources and encourages teachers to create online content using online tools thus strengthening learning management</p>

system. It makes learning cost effective as students need not travel nor stay in a particular place to pursue the course.

Response:

Government first grade college Arkalgud is permanently affiliated to the University of Mysore. The college offers 3 UG programmes B.A, B.Com and BBA, follows the curriculum prescribed by the university.

The college is effectively implemented the Choice Based Credit system (CBCS) at all levels of UG since 2018 and implementation of NEP from 2021-22.

The following measures have been taken for productive delivery of curriculum in the institution.

Preparation of Timetable

Time table committee is constituted in every academic year to frame the timetable in advance for the upcoming semester, headed by the senior faculty. The timetable committee prepares timetable under the guidance of the principal for the smooth delivery of the curriculum during working days spread across two semesters in each academic year.

Preparation of lesson plan

- One internal assessment test is held centrally in every semester.

The principal also conducts meeting with the teachers and non-teaching faculties to ensure smooth implementation of the activities as scheduled.

For the transparency of functioning both the university and the college academic calendars are placed on the college website.

The institution provides a good academic environment for the students to enhance their learning levels. Apart from classroom teaching, students are motivated to approach the faculty for academic discussions that in turn help them to understand the concepts better and thereby perform well in the assessment and examinations.

All the departments carry out internal assessments based on student's performance in the periodical tests, classroom seminars, group discussions and assignments. The institution conducts examinations at the end of the each semester as per the university timetable.

Under CBCS system, the students are evaluated on continuous basis. In a semester students internally evaluated twice with C1 and C2 components carrying a weightage of 10 marks for each component, followed by an external evaluation of C3 component with a weightage of 80 marks.

The students are informed well in advance about the deadline for assignment submission, dates for IA tests as well as their final internal assessment marks. Criteria for assessment is also shared with the students. They are encouraged to seek guidance from teachers.

The internal evaluation process is carried out as per the guidelines issued by the university from time to time.

2.2 Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organises special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Response:

The College is a Government Institution and it adopts a transparent admission process. Students from general merit, scheduled caste, tribe, backward communities, minorities, students with excellent academic credentials and first-generation learners from economically disadvantaged sections of the society seek admissions to the College. Thus, diversity is visible in the admission process.

- The admission committee of the college counsels students and their parents and guide them in selecting the programme and courses. The college gives an opportunity to all the aspiring students who seek admission.
- There has been a steady increase in the number of girl students getting admission to this college over the years which indicates that the institution is catering to the educational need of rural girls who do not have access to higher education.
- The Divyangjan in particular are encouraged to participate in all activities of the college.
- At the beginning of every academic year the IQAC plans an orientation programme to create awareness about the college and its website, courses, activities, facilities available in the various committees and cells.
- The College identifies the learning needs of advanced and slow learners by taking into consideration the marks obtained in the previous qualifying exams, based on student's interaction and interest in the class.

Following activities are done by teachers for students:

Slow learners:

1. Extra class and individual guidance from the subject teacher by solving question papers of previous years from the students.
2. Remedial classes, group study, providing simple study materials, technical assistance to use LMS app created by DCE.
3. Revision of important concepts or missed chapters in a viable manner.
4. Slow learners make use of tutorial classes conducted by the faculty for one on one interaction.
5. Teacher mentors also take the counselling of the slow learners for the improvement of the overall problems.

Along with the above efforts the following are also conducted

1. Individual counselling.

2. Remedial Classes.
3. Group discussion session.
4. Internal examination.
5. Home Assignments.
6. Encouragement in NSS and academic activities.

Advance learners:

1. To enhance their confidence level, the college conducts various activities such as Cultural, NSS to develop their overall personality.
2. Field visits to various factories, enhanced advanced learner's curiosity about learning.
3. Semester toppers and rank holders are felicitated on the Annual Day.

2.3 Teaching- Learning Process

2.3.1 Student centric methods, such as experiential learning, participative learning and problem solving methodologies are used for enhancing learning experiences

Response:

Our College follows a student-centric process employing experiential, participative, and problem solving methods, through Experiential and Participatory Teaching Methodology. The students have been taught to work out problems, solve question papers and assignments.

The college encourages students to use ICT, where students prepare PowerPoint presentations on their subjects, the college also invites eminent personalities from various fields of expertise to give different dimensions of thought provoking lectures.

Experiential and Participatory Teaching-Learning methods:

Experiential and Participatory Teaching-Learning methods constitute an integral component of the curriculum and of the continuous evaluation.

Our College provides learning through experiences by organizing activities like workshops, industrial visits, technical sessions and team building activities.

Industrial visits to various manufacturing industries are organized to enhance practical thinking of our students.

Educational tours are organized to provide in-depth knowledge among our students.

Participative learning: Along with traditional teaching, the students are encouraged to make use of seminars, guest lectures, Rangers and Rovers, use of audio visual help to enhance teaching learning experience.

- An orientation program is organized for first year students on the first day of college, where the students are made aware of the facilities, faculties and other activities present in the college.
- Guest lectures from various fields of expertise are arranged in the college which widened the scope of thinking among the students.
- Problem solving sessions and group discussions are organized regularly for collaborative learning of the students.
- NSS, Rangers and Rovers aim at enhancing discipline and way of leading life.
- Students are encouraged to participate in the ECO club which propagates protection of environment.

Problem Solving: The students are given an opportunity to work on case studies related to their field of studies.

- Practical case studies in question papers are discussed in class by teachers and students for the benefit of whole group.
- Role-playing, help them to pacify the curiosity of their problem raised while learning in the class.

2.3.2 Teachers use ICT enabled tools for effective teaching-learning process.

Response:

College has always been encouraging its faculty members to use ICT enabled tools for the best outcome of the Teaching-Learning process including online resources for effective teaching and learning process.

The college motivates faculties and students by facilitating them to acquire basic skills with proper guidance. Audio and video tools like Whats App, Zoom, Google Meet, Teachmint are used by faculties for online classes. The teachers provide online course materials to students through one of these apps regularly.

There are 4 ICT enabled classrooms in the campus. The campus is Wi-Fi enabled. There is 01 Seminar Hall which is well equipped with ICT facilities. Some of the tools used by the faculty for Teaching-Learning are LCD Screen and Projectors.

Imparting knowledge through ICT is further boosted by Collegiate Education by providing E-Patashala, E-Adhyayan, Vijayibhav, and also introducing the LMS portal where faculty experts prepare content for every university syllabi across the statewide. The content includes ppts, videos, study materials, MCQs, and uploads on YouTube channels and also created awareness about courses available in SWAYAM portal among students.

Another major aid by the government is to distributing free laptops and tablet pcs to diminish the economic burden to buy electronic devices. Thus students are encouraged to actively participate in an advanced style of learning.

Three departments successfully conducted online webinars on various topics. Faculties were encouraged to learn Kannada and English typing. All the teaching and non-teaching faculties cleared the CLT exam. The college website also helps students to get old question papers, details of ongoing events, and announcements.

The following are key features followed by the teaching staff are,

1) Our college is well equipped with computer Lab where 58 Computers are available for teachers and students to prepare power point presentations and also institutions encourages students to learn Kannada and English typing.

1) Information & Communications Technology (ICT) enabled teaching methodologies and advanced

technology are being followed by the faculty members in class rooms.

2) The academic calendar, lesson plan, Time table, unit test schedule and question banks with solutions are made available at the beginning of every semester.

3) The use of multimedia teaching aids like, LCD projectors, classrooms with internet enabled computer/laptops/tablet systems are usually in use in the classrooms.

4) The Teachers use tools like PPT presentations, e-resources to conduct classes by involving students in learning and interpreting the concepts in their own language and asking questions to students.

5) The faculty use power point presentations to deliver the lectures effectively by incorporating student-centric methods like asking questions, encouraging students to interpret the topic in their own words, etc. Apart from syllabus contents, latest developments in the field are also discussed in the class.

2.5 Evaluation Process and Reforms

2.5.1 Mechanism of internal assessment is transparent and robust in terms of frequency and mode

Response:

The evaluation system is transparent, fair, and works as planned. The Controller of Examinations (COE)

ensures that the examination system follows a clearly outlined process, which helps students and faculty to plan their academic schedules effectively. Flexibility and diversity in the evaluation schemes are encouraged by College to cater to the different needs of students.

The College, as per the regulations prescribed by the Mysore University, conducts the internal evaluation in a transparent and time-bound manner. Internal assessment includes internal tests, assignments and presentations and also attendance. Each of these components is given weightage as per the university norms, and marks are awarded accordingly. Students are oriented about the assessment process during induction programme. Copies of Regulations and syllabus are hosted on the college website for the benefit of the students.

Students are made aware of the evaluation process through the following initiatives:

- The orientation programmes at the beginning of the semester.
- Teaching plan contains evaluation procedure
- The dates of Internal Assessment components are announced well in advance in the class rooms as well as through group messages
- Orientation on changes and amendments in the evaluation process through meetings
- Display in the college and department notice board.
- Result analysis and review meeting Result analysis is done by the class tutors after every CIA test. Pass percentage is calculated in each course.

Conduct Examination:

At the commencement of the academic year, Principal, in consultation with faculty, constitutes Examination Committee which is responsible for smooth conduct of examinations. In consultation with the heads of various departments, the Examination Committee frames the time table for internal examinations. The internal examination schedule, syllabus and pattern are informed to the students well in advance. For conducting the examination, The Committee involves all Department HODs in the paper setting process, scrutinizes them and make all necessary preparations and arrangements.. All faculty members are assigned invigilation and participate in the evaluation process. The entire process of evaluation is completed in time-bound manner and its results are announced to the students.

- Internal examinations of 1.30 hours duration will be conducted at the end of each semester for all the theory papers and practical papers.
- Evaluated answer booklets are shown to the students after a week or so and suggestions of improvements were communicated without fail.
- At the orientation programme students were informed about the criteria of internal assessment. In case a student remains absent or fails to attain specified marks he/she is given a third improvement test.
- Continuous evaluation system also monitors that each faculty apart from two tests conducts unit tests, seminars, assignments for the learner's overall development.
- The performance of the student is monitored by the HODs and the necessary feedback is given to

the concerned faculty members. The principal conducts review meetings department wise to give necessary feedback for the improvement of student's performance.

- At every meeting Principal suggest evaluation reforms and discuss any discrepancy in the past meetings. Students should satisfy the eligibility criteria of 75 attendances in each semester to appear for the university examination. The results are announced by the university in the university website so that each student can go their results at a time.

2.5.2 Mechanism to deal with internal examination related grievances is transparent, time- bound and efficient

Response:

The college has a transparent method of internal assessment of students. The components of Internal Assessment are brought to the notice of the students during the Orientation Program and by Course faculty in their classrooms at the time of commencement of the program. Students are also well informed about the way they are being assessed continuously as per University guidelines at regular intervals. The marks secured in each subject are informed to the students immediately after the Internal Assessment is over. Corrected assignments/ test papers are returned to them. The college has an examination committee. Students can bring out their grievances, if any, to the notice of the committee or the head of the department or to the respective course faculty. The records are maintained in the department. The college is extremely supportive in catering overall development of students. It creates well transparency to assist students' achievement in the examination. Thus it ensures channelizing an optimistic environment in regard to enhance the learning experience.

College Level:

- If a student is not able to appear for examination due to medical or any genuine reason examination is conducted for that student as per norms, provided that he/she submits application with proper documents.
- The grievances of the students with reference to assessment are made clear by showing his/her performance in the answer sheet. The answer sheet of such student is assessed by the faculty once again in the presence of the student. Any corrections in the total of marks or assessment of answer books as identified by students are immediately done by the faculty members.
- Any student who is not satisfied with the assessment and award of marks may approach the concern HOD who can intervene and seek opinion of another course Teacher.

The Institute follows open evaluation system where the student performance is displayed on the notice board.

University level:

· With reference to evaluation, if the student scores less mark than expected, he/she can apply for reevaluation of his/her answer script after paying the prescribed fee.

· University provides the photocopy of answer sheets to students regarding any grievances with reference to evaluation. Student can apply for reevaluation if he/she feels that evaluation is not correct.

6.4.3 Institutional strategies for mobilisation of funds and the optimal utilisation of resources

Response:

The institution has various sources of funds and strategies to mobilise funds and utilise it optimally.

Karnataka state government: The institution gets grants from the department of collegiate education of karnataka to provide basic facilities such as infrastructure, honorarium to guest faculty, library book purchase etc. apart from salary to permanent employees.

College Development Committee (CDC) Fund : This fund is used for college development. It is operated by a committee chaired by a local Member of the Legislative Assembly (MLA) and the principal in secretary role along with nominated members.

Admission fees: It is paid by the students at the time of admission and consists of three components. Government fees, University fees collected by institution and remitted to government and university respectively. Quasi government fees collected and retained by institution

- 1. Government Fees:** DCE sets certain fees to be paid by students for BA/BCOM/BBA programs such as admission fees, tuition fees etc.
- 2. University fees:** Mysore University sets various fees to be paid by students for BA/BCOM/BBA programs such as University registration fees, Literary and cultural program fees etc.
- 3. Quasi government fees:** The institution collects and retains certain fees for BA/BCOM/BBA programs such as identity card fees, sports fees etc.

Funds and Committees for specific purpose: The institution has various funds for IQAC, sports, cultural etc. and committees to utilise the funds under the leadership of the principal such as IQAC committee for quality assurance, Cultural committee for cultural activities, Purchase committee for purchases, etc. Thus, committees ensure optimum utilisation of resources and funds required for the specific activities and are

mobilised and utilised as per the institutional requirement.

Case study: Cultural Committee Fund

The fees for cultural activity is collected at the time of admission annually and subsequently, it is credited to the cultural committee fund. As the academic year begins the cultural committee is formed, the principal of the institution is the president of the committee and one of the teaching staff/ non- teaching staff is assigned co-ordinator role, other members are also there in the committee.

Cultural committee meeting is called to discuss and finalise the resource requirement, planning, budgeting, place and suitable persons to do the task in the cultural event.

State level cultural competition was held in 2019-20 by following the above procedure. Cultural committee coordinator organised the event, delegated various tasks to others and ensured the activity was properly conducted and concluded. After the conclusion of the program the amount of money spent was reimbursed/paid to the committee coordinator or other members only after submission of valid bills for the expenditure incurred for the specific program.

Books of accounts and Audit: Checks and balances are maintained by keeping records of books of accounts and relevant documents pertaining to utilisation of resources. Internal and external audit is conducted to ensure the optimum utilisation of resources.

Solid waste management

The institution is located in and around the green surroundings. The college recognizes the fact that it being in a rural area has to bear the responsibility of creating awareness among the students and local public about the management of waste in a scientific manner.

The institution has taken several initiatives to create awareness among the local public and students about the disposal of waste. Measures are taken to inform the students about segregating waste and their scientific disposal. Special lectures have been organized by the institution to create awareness among the students about water conservation and waste management.

Keeping the campus clean and healthy is one of the foremost of the institution. NSS and Scout and Guides are voluntarily have taken to keep and manage to disposal waste things and help keep the college clean. Every classroom, staff room office room are provided with dustbins and placed for storing collecting solid wastes. The solid waste is regularly collected by these volunteers and dumped at a particular place and the same is loaded to the waste collection vehicle of the city municipality which disposes the waste at a

particular place. Proper drainage and pits are there for the proper disposal of liquid waste.

Waste recycling system

The wastewater and rainwater are collected in the college into collecting tanks, and the water is reused for watering plants and cleaning the college. The wastewater has also been collected in the underground tank on the college premises and thus it is ensured that a maximum amount of rainwater resource has been collected for reuse purposes in the college.

E-waste management

The institution also takes measures for scientific disposal of e-waste and electronic waste like UPS, battery, other wastes like furniture, paper, plastic, and some iron wastes are sold and all these wastes are further recycled.

Waste recycling system

The institution has constructed an organic manure pit, the pit being constructed by the NSS volunteers of the college, whereby it is ensured that the solid waste of the college is collected in the pit and decomposed through organic wastes. The NSS volunteers of the college have themselves constructed a manure pit. All the biodegradable waste of the college has been collected in this pit. - The bag round of the students is such as ill-literate, farmers & day worker's family etc.
- They are facing problems like fear, inferiority complex and stage fear in learning.
- They are from rural areas like small villages and it is very difficult to capitated with urban students while getting jobs.
- Previous course like PU only they have gained basic education and it is only base.
- Mix type of students there such as fast learners, low learners and very slow learners.

The Practice:

- Teaching faculty have actively participated teaching and learning process.
- Each department faculties work hard and have taken several steps to improve result of the students.
- Teachers have tried to make understand syllabus in simple method.
- Teachers are used traditional and non- tradition teaching technique. Traditional teaching method is teacher teach lessons through teaching using back and green boards and teaching aids. Non-Traditional teaching method is using protector to make understand the lesson simple way. This method is more attractive. Some teachers are also shown some videos and movies based on only on syllabus.
- From above struggles of teachers, the students are scored good and better marks in exams.
- The principal, Smt. Smitha. HS, Rs10.000/ deposited in DatthiNidhi account of her father's name Sridhara Murthy and Rs1200/ annual interest credited and who has been practising to award those who score highest marks in Optional Kannada.
- Teachers are also taken personal interest to encourage student's performance in exams. Since 2017-18 our teaching faculty are practicing distribute Endowment and cash prize. The purpose of this practice is to encourage rural students.
- Teacher invite rank students and their parents to honour them and it motivates other students.

Evidence of Success:

- Only few teachers have been practicing Endowment of cash prize for rank students. Coming years IQAC coordinators will be motivate to other teachers to fallow the practice.
